## COORDINATOR AND ASST' POSITION OPEN

Applications are now available for positions of one Coordinator, one Assistant Coordinator and 26 advising interns in the Academic Advising Intern Program for the 1973-74 academic year.

The Coordinator and Assistant

Coordinator will be responsible for the overall administration, including budget responsibility, program evaluation, intern training, communication with departments, etc.

Advising internships will be available in the following departments: teaching divisions, and colleges: Agricultural Resources, Agricultural Sciences, Ag Exploratory, Food and Consumer Sciences, Engineering, Art, Psychology, Political Science, Chicano Studies, English, Economics, Shemistry, History, Zoology, Biological Sciences, Physiology,

and Botany. Applicants for advising intern positions should have a well-grounded knowledge of the operation, function and personnel in the unit for which they are applying. Their duties generally consist of advising other student in the areas of college, university, and departmental requirements; program planning, career information, graduate options, etc.

Final deadlines for applying for these positions are April 11 for Coordinator and Assistant Coordinator and April 18 for the interns.

Coordinator and assistant coordinator applicants will be interviewed between April 12 and April 19.

## INTERN POSITIONS AVAILABLE

Applications for intern positions with the Preprofessional Advising Office for the 1973-74 school year will be available in 224 South Hall from April 11 through April 20.

The office is new this year and is attempting to meet the need for more health science advising on this campus. Because of the expanding opportunities for minorities in the health sciences, it is very important that the office staff include minority students who can both encourage and advise other minority students contemplating careers in the health sciences. If you are interested in helping other students define their career goals, helping them with professional school application procedures, and in addition, would be willing to develop more information on new health careers, you are encouraged to apply.

The office is presently staffed by two Full-time employees and ten student interns. Interns work 10 weeks per quarter for the three academic quarters each year and are paid \$2.47 per hour. The following positions will be available for next year: One first year (currently) medical student (5 hours/week)

veterinary student (5 hours/week) Five registered UCD students interested in any of a variety of health careers such as dentistry, medical technology, medicine, nursing, and physical therapy preference given to upper division students (10 hours/week each)

## SUBJECT A CLINIC

The staff of the Subject A Department is offering an open writing clinic for the Spring Quarter. This clinic will be available to any member of the campus community who feels he might need some help with his writing but who cannot manage to schedule or does not really need to take a regular class in composition. The instructors working in the clinic will be available to offer their advice to students writing papers for regular classes, to staff members who would like to make their memos more effective, to graduate students writing dissertations, and even to faculty members whose grammar may be a bit rusty. No fee is charged for this service and no class credit is offered.

Instructors will be available in the Ir Sproul Hall offices at the following times: Monday, 10-11 and 2-5; Tuesday, 9-5; Wednesday, 9-11 and 1-5; Thursday, 9-12 and 1-4. "Dropping by" for help could be disappointing since the instructor might already be busy with someone. It would be best, therefore, to telephone the Subject A Office (7520450) and make a definite appointment.

The history of agricultural land use regulation in California from 1954 to 1972 is discussed in a recent publication by the Institute of Governmental Affairs at the University of California, Davis.

The 44-page report, by former IGA research assistant Rita M. Mize, is entitled "Interest Group Opinion and California Land Use Regulation." It details the early problems faced by both farmers and urban planners, including leapfrog development and urban sprawl, and various solutions, from greenbelt zoning to preferential assessment.

The report, part of IGA's Environmental Quality series, pays special attention to the California Land Conservation Act of 1965, also known as the Williamson Act.

The study also places special emphasis on the types of organization involved with various stages of development of
